The S&P 500 Index rallied 0.39% in April with its lowest total range in several months. Volatility remained relatively low as measured by the CBOE Volatility Index (VIX) but rallied in the last week and ended up slightly for the month. U.S. economic numbers were mixed in April.

Employment continued to grow, with 215,000 job gains reported in April. Labor participation and wage growth both ticked up slightly for the month. Poor consumer confidence and slowing month-over-month sales growth indicates reluctance for the consumer to spend. GDP showed small (0.5%) growth for the first quarter of 2016 but was well below the previous quarter of 1.4%. WTI Crude rallied 15.52%.

We are starting to see some cautionary headlines emerge:

- Icahn disclosing a NET SHORT position equivalent to 149% of his AUM¹
- Stan Druckenmiller had a provocative doomsday speech at the Sohn conference
- Bank of America Merrill Lynch's Head of U.S. Equity & Quantitative Strategy warning of trouble in the summer
- Andrew Sheets, Morgan Stanley's chief cross-asset strategist, also saying buy volume in May
- Deutsche's Torsten Slok, Chief Economist also turning bearish on U.S. equities – valuations, lack of margin expansion, event risk, Fed Hike risk

It is also hard to ignore the catalysts that are fast approaching:

- European Central Bank (ECB) meeting June 2nd
- Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) meeting June 2nd
- Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) meetings June 15th
- Bank of Japan (BOJ) meeting June 16th
- Brexit vote June 23rd

The James Alpha Managed Risk Domestic Equity Fund was up 0.10% in April versus 0.39% for the S&P 500 Total Return Index. The index is now down -0.20% versus -2.11% in the Fund since our inception. Heading into May, the Fund's strategy is to oversize downside protection while attempting to limit the short call strategy as a result of the contraction in option premium levels.

DEFINITIONS

Bank of Japan (BoJ): The Bank of Japan is the Japanese central bank. The bank is responsible for issuing and handling currency and treasury securities, implementing monetary policy, maintaining the stability of the Japanese financial system, and providing settling and clearing services.

Brexit: An abbreviation of "British exit" that mirrors the term Grexit, refers to the possibility of Britain's withdrawal from the European Union.

CBOE Volatility Index (VIX): Shows the market's expectation of 30-day volatility. It is constructed using the implied volatilities of a wide range of S&P 500 index options. This volatility is meant to be forward-looking and is calculated from both calls and puts. The VIX is a widely used measure of market risk and is often referred to as the "investor fear gauge."

European Central Bank (ECB): The central bank of the euro and administers monetary policy of the Eurozone, which consists of 19 EU member states and is one of the largest currency areas in the world.

Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC): The branch of the Federal Reserve Board that determines the direction of monetary policy. The FOMC meets eight times per year to set key interest rates, such as the

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discount rate, and to decide whether to increase or decrease the money supply, which the Fed does by buying and selling government securities.

Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC): An organization consisting of the world's major oil-exporting nations. OPEC was founded in 1960 to coordinate the petroleum policies of its members, and to provide member states with technical and economic aid. OPEC is a cartel that aims to manage the supply of oil in an effort to set the price of oil on the world market, in order to avoid fluctuations that might affect the economies of both producing and purchasing countries.

S&P 500 Index: An index of 500 stocks chosen for market size, liquidity and industry grouping, among other factors. The S&P 500 is designed to be a leading indicator of U.S. equities and is meant to reflect the risk/return characteristics of the large cap universe.

Volatility: A statistical measure of the dispersion of returns for a given security or market index. Volatility can either be measured by using the standard deviation or variance between returns from that same security or market index.
